Stuart Hall's 165th Graduation

Stuart Hall's 165th Graduation was Saturday, June 7 on Paradise Lawn beside Old Main. Our graduation speaker this year was Denise Wooldridge '76. Ms. Wooldridge has served on the Stuart Hall Board of Governors and Board of Trustees and currently serves on the Foundation Board and as Class Agent. An executive at Kraft, Ms. Wooldridge was one of the first African American students to attend the School. During the graduation service, the seniors processed under an archway of shepherds' crooks held by chosen friends, a tradition dating back to the 19th century.

All of the 26 young men and women of the Class of 2008 will attend college. They received over \$1.6M in scholarships. In addition to receiving these scholarships and being accepted to over 30 of the nation's prestigious colleges and universities - including Purdue University, Davidson, the University of Virginia, the College of William and Mary, Virginia Tech, University of Michigan, Catholic University, and Corcoran College of Art and Design - the senior class has exhibited leadership at Stuart Hall through participation in athletics, visual and performing arts, community service, and achieving academic excellence.

Here is an excerpt from Anne Simon's comments at the Leadership Recognition Assembly:

So what is the difference between growing and becoming more mature, and Leadership? I think that each of you could easily answer this question. You know that Leadership is applying what you have learned, how you have grown, and the maturity you have gained, to serving others and contributing to the world around you. At Hunter McGuire, you have taken on numerous jobs over the years that have gradually turned you into the leaders that you are today. In Kindergarten you began by collecting donations of needed items for the Wildlife Center. In first grade you gathered the paper from all around school for recycling. In second grade you were reading buddies and took food to the Food Bank. In third grade you put on a toy drive and collected necessary things for the Manchesters to take to a foster home in China.
